#### PARISH COUNCIL BUDGET 2008/9

The Council has drafted its budget point of reporting accidents, serious or for 2008/9 based on what the Council might reasonably expect to achieve in the year. So provision for traffic calming and control measures have been taken out of the budget, as both the Police and County Highways have told us that there is no realistic prospect of installing flashing speed signs in the Village. The reported accident record is not serious enough to warrant such measures and it was agreed to ask residents to make a

otherwise, to the Police. If the Parish Council does decide to go ahead with a Speedwatch scheme, using a speed indicator device (SID), the cost can be met from existing reserves.

Provision has also been made for a cost of living increase to the Clerk's salary and to other routine running costs, for paying a members' allowance and for alternative arrangements for producing

the Newsletter.

The Council is in the process of acquiring a small area of amenity land in Station Road and has budgeted funds for initial clearance of this overgrown site, and keeping it clean and tidy thereafter.

## LOXWOOD PARISH COUNCIL - 70 YEARS OLD

Local democracy has long held a firm place in Loxwood, and the Parish Council still continues to play an important role in fighting for the local con- Later minutes indicate continued efcerns of its electorate.

Their first meeting was held in North Hall on Thursday 21<sup>st</sup> April 1938, following the decision to create a new separate Parish due to the increase in The old minutes make fascinating readsize of the village. Prior to that, Loxwood had been part of the Wisborough Green Parish.

Undoubtedly times have changed over the intervening 70 years, but certain themes and concerns are as important to Loxwood residents today as they were then. For example the minutes of that first meeting record that amongst • other matters, the Council considered the following:

- "The provision of a separate policeman in Loxwood" - rejected by the Chief Constable!
- Concern over the Ministry of Health's slow implementation of the District Council's Water Scheme.
- A question regarding an obstructed Right of Way at Pigbush Lane.
- An unsafe bridge on common land near the School.
- The Clerk was instructed to "ascertain the exact position with regard to the proposed electricity supply for Loxwood" and to enquire "as to the legal position with regard to the Loxwood Recreation Ground". Both

- In December 1939 for example, the minutes refer specifically to problems with staffing arrangements at County slowing down requests from Loxwood, due to the "existing war conditions".
  - In October 1940 the Parish Council sought compensation for damage to the surface of the Recreation Ground as a "result of damage by enemy action by reason of bombs".
  - In January 1941, Mr CM Taylor, the Clerk had be replaced temporarily as he was called up for Military Service.

The minutes provide a wealth of interesting information, although obviously far too much to detail here. They not only provide an accurate account of

what was said and done by the Council on behalf of the residents of Loxwood, but also they provide us with a fascinating insight into the concerns of the day.
